

Pastor Christopher Davis Receives Lamb Award



In the northern serene town of Dorset, MN (population 22) where the Eagles nest and the fishing is great, a small historic stone church, First English Lutheran, was the sight of a Lutheran Lamb Religious Emblem presentation.

Pastor and Scoutmaster Christopher Davis (Troop 56 of Nevis) was presented with the Lamb Award by Northern Minnesota Missouri

Synod President Reverend Fondow and by a member of the board of directors for the National Lutheran Association on Scouting, Loren Meinke. Elder Charles Dutschmann presented Pastor Chris the certificate on behalf of the congregation.

The Lutheran Lamb Award was designed to express appreciation for outstanding leadership and significant contributions by an adult to the spiritual, social and physical lives of young people. Reverend Chris Davis is one such individual. Chris has given generously of his time so that young people in the community may have richer lives. Chris was honored for his dedication and commitment to youth and was recognized with the Lutheran Lamb Award. The award consists of a medallion with a lamb and cross on it symbolizing Christ as the Lamb of God and on the reverse side is scripture from John 21:15, "Feed My Lambs." It is suspended on a red ribbon symbolizing the blood of Christ.



In his early professional life, Chris served as a vicar and when he received the call for First English Lutheran, he felt blessed. He has served that same parish since 2003.

His service in Scouting has been exemplary. Chris has served as a Tiger Adult, Scout Parent, Pack Trainer, Assistant Scoutmaster and is currently serving as the Scoutmaster for Troop 56. He is a beaded Wood Badger and has served on the 2016 Central Minnesota Council Woodbadge staff. As a volunteer he has also served as a religious emblems counselor for youth in the God and Me, God and Family, God and Church and God and Life Programs. He has received the Brotherhood Honor of the Order of the Arrow that is the Boy Scouts of America's honor society.
